



OPTION 2 - 3-DAY TOUR

Day 1: Historic Center and Basilica of Guadalupe: The Spiritual and Monumental Heart of the Country

Begin your exploration in Mexico City's Historic Center, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Here, among cobblestone streets and stone facades, history blends with modern bustle.

Walk through the Zócalo, one of the largest squares in the world, surrounded by architectural treasures: the Metropolitan Cathedral, with its impressive Baroque altarpiece and Gothic towers, and the Templo Mayor, a visual journey through the history of Mexico's first settlers, Tenochtitlan. Lunch will take place at the iconic Bajío Restaurant, with its stunning colonial architecture, formerly the home of Saint Anne.

Later, the route will take you to the Basilica of Guadalupe, where millions of pilgrims flock each year to pay homage to Mexico's patron saint. The modernity of the main temple, designed with a copper dome and a circular structure that allows the Virgin's mantle to be seen from any vantage point, is complemented by the ancient 16th-century chapels that crown Tepeyac Hill.

The complex forms a serene and majestic space, ideal for those seeking spiritual relaxation as well as those who enjoy architecture and living traditions.



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Day 2 - Teotihuacán Pyramids and Ciudadela Market: Ancient Ingenuity and Modern Folk Art

Just over an hour from the capital lies the City of the Gods, Teotihuacán.

Its perfectly aligned avenues, temples oriented according to the stars, and the monumental Pyramids of the Sun and the Moon are testament to the advanced astronomical and hydraulic knowledge of this pre-Columbian civilization.

Visitors can climb the ancient staircases of the Pyramid of the Moon and the Pyramid of Quetzalcoatl to enjoy a breathtaking view of the valley and feel the energy that still vibrates between the stones.

After an energizing morning, lunch awaits you at the Teocalli restaurant, an ideal place to relax and enjoy a wide-ranging culinary experience. If you prefer, you can participate in a tortilla-making workshop, where you can taste the creations made on the spot.

In the afternoon, color and creativity fill the air at the Ciudadela Handicraft Market, an iconic space where handicrafts from all over Mexico converge. Each stall tells a story: embroidered textiles from Oaxaca, ceramics from Puebla, masks from Guerrero, and Huichol art from Nayarit. A feast of colors, textures, and aromas that will delight both curious connoisseurs and those seeking authentic souvenirs.

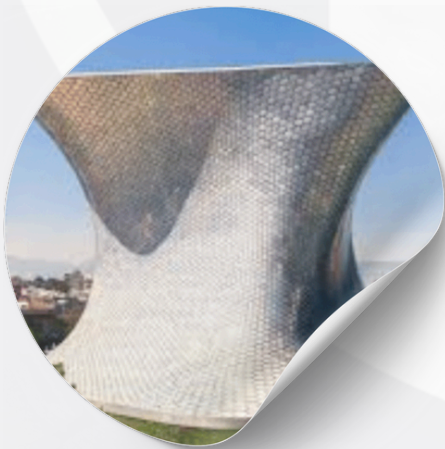
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Day 3 - Soumaya Museum, Paseo Masaryk, and Afternoon Shopping: Mexican Art, Design, and Style

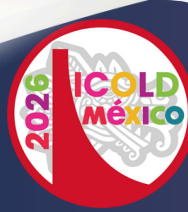

After lunch, enjoy a stroll along the elegant Avenida Masaryk in the exclusive Polanco neighborhood. With luxury boutiques, designer galleries, terrace restaurants, and cozy cafes, this district offers the perfect balance between cosmopolitan sophistication and Mexican hospitality. Families and their companions can relax, shop, or simply enjoy the vibrant atmosphere of one of the capital's most refined areas.
